Any Bravo Brothers who went swimming in the bomb craters out by the Cambodian border should contact their U.S. Representative and the VA. That beautiful turquoise blue water in those craters was full of Agent Orange and dioxin. I finished chemotherapy last January for DEL Lymphoma.

**Submitted by Richard Magner (Tiger 38, D/229th (Smiling Tigers), 1st Cav 68/69)** On the 25th of this past month, I visited the site of the mass grave site resulting from the June 1969 Battle of FSB Crook, and our team gave the local authorities and military command a report documenting our research regarding the mass grave of those buried in what had been a 500 pound bomb crater. Over the course of the last two weeks of June, we visited seven provinces of Vietnam sharing our research of 21 battles and grave sites, eight of which were in Tay Ninh province. In June of 2020, a survey excavation discovered the northern rim of the crater on the site of a construction company. At that time, the center of the crater was thought to be under structures of the property owner, so further excavation was delayed for a reimbursement process. Analysis of more current satellite images show the crater's center to be farther west and clear of the structure.
